We recognise the energy and dynamic leadership that Nick brought to every meeting, event and conversation, and we wish him well in his next chapter.

Our highly relational network holds us in good stead for the future as we keep coming together with compassion and conviction towards our vision to create a just, inclusive, and sustainable society.

SENVIC is committed to diversifying the voices in social enterprise by promoting lived-experience participation, nurturing emerging leaders, and facilitating collaboration through opportunities for sector and system building. We are thrilled to witness the emergence of collaborative efforts among social enterprises based on location and thematic focus, engaging a cross-section of organisations.

The trust and resilience cultivated over the past year has primed us for the next phase of our journey as a network of networks committed to driving systemic change. I wish to acknowledge the heart, vision and exceptional skills of founding Director, Rebecca Scott, whose five years of dedicated service to SENVIC's Board have been instrumental in establishing and growing the network in this important direction. We are deeply thankful for the leadership, friendship and dedication Bec has brought to SENVIC's Board, which we know will continue to permeate the network.

And finally, we extend our heartfelt gratitude to our SENVIC members, the lifeblood of our network, for the tireless efforts in their daily work and for coming together beyond individual endeavours to cultivate relationships and trust that rejuvenate lives, places, and our planet.

Statement of Achievement

SENVIC's third annual report celebrates the momentous and cumulative impact of a diverse and growing membership base. This year has been characterised by the emergence of a significant number of community-based hubs, clusters, sub networks, collectives, movements, systems, and innovative projects that amplify our impact.

Delivering on the second year of SENVIC's Strategic Plan (2022-25), our work to create an inclusive, adaptive, and enabling social enterprise ecosystem is well under way. Our message has reached wider audiences with a 50% increase in social media reach and our membership numbers have doubled. A quarter of our membership base now identify as coming from diverse or marginalised communities. Our members come from all corners of Victoria, with nearly 40% of all postcodes represented.

The model of a 'self-organising network of networks' across Victoria is a foundation piece for SENVIC. The revitalisation of our five regional networks this year ignited a remarkable 30% growth in regional membership. A state-wide network has been achieved through the establishment of six new metropolitan networks, which resulted in a more than twofold growth in Melbourne-based membership.

Under the stewardship of the SENVIC Regional and Metropolitan Managers we have connected with diverse and geographically dispersed communities across Victoria. We have supported and delivered 11 Local Action Plans and have enabled cross-sector and statewide partnerships and collaborations. Thank you to each and every one of our 29 SENVIC Local Leads. You are the eyes, ears, and hearts on the ground, working in, and with your local communities.

Collectively we have run more than 39 events to connect, develop and influence over 1400 participants. We have supported the creation of hubs, small town big impact forums and regenerative conversations. We designed and delivered the Emerging Leaders Program and auspiced the expansion of the Queen Victoria Market Purpose Precinct alongside Green Cycles and STREAT.

These successes are clear demonstrations of our ongoing commitment and success in delivering the Victorian Government's 2021-25 Victorian Social Enterprise Strategy.

At both the State and National levels, SENVIC has contributed to shaping policy portfolios across government. We have created avenues for members to actively engage through online submission tools, workshops, and outreach in our communication platforms and networks. This work not only amplified the voices of our members but has fostered profound conversations regarding the systemic change needed to create a just, inclusive and sustainable society.

At the Local Government level, we remain dedicated to our advocacy for strategic partnerships. In the past 12 months, we've seen a substantial engagement with local government, with 65 representatives actively participating in and presenting at our events.

We continue to find new ways to enable our members to be the leaders, the doers and the voice for a just, inclusive and sustainable society. Our members collectively create our effective and sustainable network. Our focus is to enable you.

Thank you to the SENVIC staff and management team Nick Verginis, Danielle Pullin, Sakshi Thakur, Carmel Riley, Anna Morgan, Tiara Shafiq and Clea Smith for your passion, creativity and commitment.

And thank you to each and every member for the generosity of spirit that has contributed to the thriving SENVIC community.





Membership Promotion

SENVIC spotlights, showcases and elevates the voice of social enterprise through multiple channel, reaching up to seven thousand people a month.

The SENVIC Directory and map of Victorian social enterprises was launched in March 2022, and now showcases 379 social enterprises across Victoria.

According to the *Business for Good* report by Social Enterprise
Australia there are nearly 4,000
social enterprises in Victoria. We have a vision to include every social enterprise in Victoria on our directory.

The more social enterprises on our map, the more we can work to amplify the voice of social enterprise.



Statewide Network

The establishment of SENVIC's metropolitan region Local Lead network and the refreshment of our regional Local Lead network completed our statewide coverage of all 11 Regional Victoria and Suburban Development regions.

Central to SENVIC's enablement strategy is seed funding to implement Local Action Plans in these regions, and the promotion of local opportunities. SENVIC encourages member participation at the local level to strengthen place-based connections, collaboration and enablement.

Our grassroots approach ensures SENVIC represents the interests of our diverse sector and can respond to local challenges and opportunities.

Southern Metropolitan Network:
Kayla Cartledge is the founder of
Our Survival Day and Our
Songlines. Kayla was also
previously Partner Relationships
Manager at Kinaway Chamber of
Commerce and is currently
Aboriginal Communities Engagement Lead at Monash
University's Centre to Impact.
Kayla is a proud Gurindji woman,
and works closely with Aboriginal
and ally businesses, Aboriginal
artists and elders.

Her approach has been community-led through hosting conversations with the social enterprise sector in her region. She focused on her established networks and strengths which include working with First Nation businesses, social enterprises and allies, and centred her activities around the needs of the community.

Metropolitan region highlights

Inner Metropolitan Network.

Bianca Stern (General Manager at All Things Equal) and Garry Williams (Founder of ALT Projects, Engagement Director at Tractor Ventures) are co-leads of the Inner Metropolitan network.

Bianca reaches out to existing social enterprises in the City of Port Phillip region to map who is in the ecosystem and the gaps that might exist for support. All Things Equal has been funded by the Jewish philanthropic network which Bianca has a strong relationship with, and is looking into how she might leverage this network to support the social enterprise sector.

Garry's approach has been to leverage his impact focused startup and investment community in the City of Melbourne and City of Yarra areas to engage and support.

Inner South East Metropolitan
Network: As the CEO of Ability
Works, Sue Boyce has a strong
network of changemakers in the
sector. Her strengths lie in bringing
together government stakeholders
to discuss social procurement
collaboration within councils. Sue
carefully designs events that
increase awareness of the social
enterprise sector within her region,
hosting workshops with industry
experts on different topics and
sharing knowledge through case
studies.

Northern Metropolitan Network:

Kim Nguyen is the founder of Global Ideas Lab, and is currently the Program Manager for Catalysr which is an accelerator program for refugees and migrants working on startups or social enterprises. She has extensive social policy and enterprise knowledge and has experience engaging with local government bodies through her social enterprise work. Her approach has been to listen to the community through building local council relationships and support.



Metropolitan region highlights

Eastern Metropolitan network. Nathaniel Diong is the Founder of Future Minds Network and works with many young people across Australia in the social enterprise and entrepreneurship sector. Nathaniel approaches existing social enterprises and local councils in the Eastern Metropolitan network to understand the best ways they can work together. The data and research he has collected informs all his Eastern Metropolitan social enterprise activities through events, mapping social enterprises in the region and awareness building activities.



Western Metropolitan Network:

Tahira Sheikh is the founder of WYN Hub, Building Cultural Connections Australia, and also works as Community Capacity Building Officer at Brimbank.

WYN Hub is a physical space in Hoppers Crossing where Tahira holds monthly meetups and creates space for conversations around women in business, social impact and not-for-profits.

Tahira's passion and her networks are centred around working with multicultural communities in the West. Her approach has been to engage and listen to the community in the West so she can identify gaps in the social enterprise ecosystem.

This approach has shaped her activities to include networking, social enterprise programs and ongoing support for social enterprises in the community.

Regional Network Highlights.

Barwon South West Regional Network:

Eliza Cook, Brooke Hyland, and Meg Price from the Give Where You Live Foundation/GROW Initiative delivered supplier mapping, awareness-raising, networking and engagement events and activities for social benefit suppliers, in Geelong and Warrnambool.

The Barwon South West region is gaining a greater understanding of social procurement opportunities and gaps for smaller social benefit suppliers in major construction projects in the Greater Geelong region. This information will inform future capacity building and networking opportunities.

Gippsland Regional Network

The Gippsland Social Enterprise Collective (GSEC) prioritised the exploration and development of the Regen movement in Gippsland.

Carmel Riley, Scott Douglas, Andrea Lane, Amelie Boucher, Sarah Tate, Alyson Skinner, Shaun Mallia, Sam Forbes, Joh Lyons, Coran Johnson, Arfa Khan and Rhonda Renwick all drove activity and action across diverse themes in the region. Focus areas included: sustainable tourism, housing, energy, and inclusive leadership.

The Gippsland region hosted a Social Enterprise World Forum (SEWF) Community Hub in Lake Tyers, connecting practitioners celebrating their work and elevating the voices of the movement.

Strikingly, this region has led the way in demonstrating the value of arts practice and community events as a powerful and innovative model of social entrepreneurship.

Network: The Loddon Mallee
Local Lead partnership extends
efforts across 400+ kilometres
from Bendigo to Mildura.
Florence Davidson and Sammy
Jetson (Christie Centre Inc.) as
well as Liz March and Jennie

network together over the past
year.

The Loddon Mallee Leads organise events, share their expertise in community forums and advocate for the social enterprise sector on the ground and at a government level.

The development of the Christie Centre's newest initiative 'SPARK' showcases an innovative model of social enterprise and social procurement that adopts a "whole community" approach.



Hume Regional Network: The Hume Social Enterprise Network team established a strong brand and online presence, marking a pivotal moment for this region.

Trish Curtis and Sophie Rhys focused on events, network development and ongoing coordination of the Hume Social Enterprise Network reference group, enhancing their impact and expertise on the ground.

This team sits at the intersection of the neighbourhood house sector and social enterprise, translating the value of social enterprise practice to curious grassroots community organisations in North East Victoria.

Regional Network Highlights.

Grampians Regional Network:

The development of a Grampians Region Advisory Council, led by seasoned social enterprise leaders with 30-plus years of combined expertise, marks a significant milestone for this region.

Robbie Millar, Pablo Gimenez, and Jessica Koenig from the Centre for Participation have fostered collaborations transcending their geographical region, partnering with seven organisations across Victoria to explore food systems and social enterprise opportunities.

The purpose of the Emerging Leaders program was to **engage**, **educate**, **support** and **celebrate** the next generation of Victorian social enterprise leaders.

Lasting six weeks, the program was delivered by industry experts and included 10 young social enterprise intrapreneurs and entrepreneurs from diverse backgrounds across regional and metropolitan Victoria.

Our Emerging Leaders program recipients attended a two-day residential workshop, weekly online learning sessions, received tickets to the Social Enterprise World Forum (SEWF22), and the program culminated in a Pitch Night to share their progress and impact.

The inspirational and impactful program left the young leaders feeling more:

- > Confident in their ability to grow
- > Connected with the social enterprise ecosystem including philanthropy and sales channels
- > **Celebrated** and supported by the social enterprise community



Social Enterprise World Forum (SEWF22)

SEWF is the most significant event on the world's social enterprise calendar - and in 2022 it came to Brisbane, Australia. This provided a momentous opportunity for Victorian social enterprises to connect with an international audience on a deeply meaningful and personal level. The energy of 3,000 passionate change-makers in one room was electric and unforgettable.

SENVIC staff attended, covering all bases from logistics, learning, strategic relationship building and strengthening and network representation. In addition we hosted and nurtured our community through dinners, after parties, breakfast meetings, and lunches. Our trip was a whirlwind of collegial chats with network activators, state gatherings, grass roots chats and deep listening with emerging social entrepreneurs and potential SENVIC members.

SENVIC's multi-faceted presence at SEWF in Brisbane at a glance:

- > Emerging Leaders Program participants received bursaries to attend SEWF and its Youth Forum. Thanks to support from White Box Enterprises.
- > Our drop-in booth provided visibility, member engagement and a meeting place for Victorian delegates.
- > SENVIC CEO contributed to the Academic Forum with a session detailing Complex Systems Theory and Practice in Victoria's Emerging Social Enterprise Network.
- > We organised casual meet up opportunities, with guest presenters including Victorian MP Sheena Watts.
- > We partnered with ACRE to produce, attend and contribute to the discussion at the Rural Gathering.

Social Enterprise Hubs and Precincts

Place, theme and industry based hubs are a central part of SENVIC's strategy. Our work has assisted with the development of key social enterprise precincts and sub-networks at various stages of establishment.

Frankston Social Enterprise Hub (FSEH): is an anchor for social enterprises in the South East Metropolitan region. Launched in 2022, FSEH builds community through events and free access to innovative wraparound support, including a co-working hub.

Auspiced by Peninsula Health and established in partnership with Chisholm Institute, and the Frankston Foundry, as part of the Victorian Government's Frankston Revitalisation Project.



The Purpose Precinct at the Queen Victoria Market

Hailed as Victoria's 'front door' to social enterprise, the Purpose Precinct was launched in December 2022, and has been expanding ever since.

Located in Melbourne's iconic Queen Victoria Markets, the precinct is designed to provide a taste of the amazing work being done by social enterprises throughout Victoria, and across Australia. It is already selling goods from more that 25 social enterprises. And it will provide employment and training pathways for 75 disadvantaged jobseekers.

Developed as a joint initiative between STREAT and Good Cycles and auspiced by SENVIC with funding through the Victorian Government Social Enterprise Strategy 2021-25 and the Melbourne City Revitalisation Fund.







The Spark Kiosk/PowerHouse project

Presented as a pitch from Sammy Jetson in the SENVIC Emerging Leaders 2022 Project. Spark is here to ignite conversation, ignite creativity and ignite the community.

Originally described as a "dream to develop a place-based social enterprise and community hub in the heart of our Mildura".

The Christie Centre has brought together government partners and stakeholders including local social enterprises, Mildura Rural City Council and a connection with Moving Feast. The project will be launched in late 2023.

Social Enterprise Hubs and Precincts

Endorsed as a sub-network of SENVIC, Moving Feast is a network of Victorian social innovators who have been collaborating for three years using a challenge-led innovation approach to address food system change.

Moving Feast includes over 30 collaborative projects across metropolitan Melbourne. We are excited to support a new phase involving statewide social enterprises in the food system.



Partnerships and Collaborations

Social Traders

Social Traders and SENVIC play an intrinsically complimentary role in growing a thriving social enterprise sector in Victoria.

SENVIC's strong practitioner-led network along with Social Traders' culture of certification is strengthening the movement that calls for 'business for good' to be business as usual.

SENVIC's statewide network supported the Social Traders Business Summit, Innovation Awards, and Regional Showcase events to raise awareness and engagement and create a clear pipeline to Social Traders procurement and certification.



StartSpace

SENVIC established a partnership with StartSpace at the State Library of Victoria to build stronger connections and help wayfinding for emergent social entrepreneurs. We have multiple events planned at SLV in 2023-24 and regularly access the supportive co-working space for emerging leaders to come together to collaborate, learn and tackle our social issues.

SENVIC continued our systemshifting partnership with WickedLab to create complex solution ecosystems that solve complex or wicked problems. Wicked Lab Complex Systems Leadership Program was offered to SENVIC staff, local leads and members across Victoria.

We are working with all levels of government to amplify your voice.

We continue to benefit from a network of social enterprise leaders with a **seat at the table** in Local, State and Federal Governments.

We are creating new channels to **encourage and empower** the wider social enterprise community **to participate** in shaping our policy environment. SENVIC's advocacy initiatives this year have included:

- > Events where State and Federal politicians addressed the room and networked with members.
- > Co-promotion of the national social enterprise marketing playbook to #changethegame.

- > Future-planning workshops in-person and online, to allow members to contribute to the future vision of the Purpose Precinct.
- > SENVIC staff and Board represented in numerous public media to advocate for social enterprise. On podcasts, radio and online.



> In March 2023, SENVIC joined Australia's social enterprise leaders at Parliament House in a round table discussion to inform a national social enterprise strategy.

It was a magnificent achievement. We united with local social enterprise networks from coast-to-coast to connect with every MP constituency and every portfolio, and call on the Albanese Government to back the social enterprise movement.

SENVIC advocates for a thriving social enterprise ecosystem.

- Advocated and encouraged members to to apply for a \$25m Regional Recycling fund.
- > Surveyed members on the value of social enterprise networks to contribute to future strategies.
- > Encouraged members to participate in social procurement focus groups by Major Roads Projects Victoria.
- >Advocated for for social enterprises to be included in Commonwealth Games planning.
- >Mapped social enterprises to share with Local Councils.



Working Future: White Paper on Jobs and Opportunities

SENVIC actively advocated for social enterprises to be central to the Federal Government's Jobs Inquiry, held in 2022-23.

We designed easy-to-use online tools to streamline the submission process for members.

SENVIC made our own submission to the Inquiry - a result of consultation with members at workshops, coordination with national bodies and through our online Submission Assistant.

Our 17 page submission contained 12 detailed recommendations centred on social enterprise as a ready-made solution to create employment pathways and financial independence for Australia's most marginalised job seekers.

National collaboration



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
